Using her own work in the global south as an example, Professor Hodgson will give her insight on the use of ethnography as a research method and will provide tips on how to overcome some of the challenges that can emerge during fieldwork. If you are interested in qualitative research methods or if you are planning to do fieldwork soon, don't miss Dr. Hodgson's talk!

The lecture by Dr .Dorothy Hodgson is the first in a series sponsored by the SC&I DSA, with additional funding from the GSA, to expose doctoral students to various disciplinary and methodological approaches and to foster dialog between doctoral students and faculty of different departments and institutions.

Dorothy Hodgson is a Professor in the Department of Anthropology at Rutgers University. She is also the director of the Institute for Research on Women and the President-elect of the Association of Feminist Anthropology. A cultural anthropologist with long term research in Tanzania, she is currently writing a book of essays on the ethics of politics of ethnographic research that draws over her over 20 years of research experience. She is the author of *Once Intrepid Warriors: Gender, Ethnicity, and the Cultural Politics of Maasai Development* (2001) and *The Church of Women: Gendered Encounters between Maasai and Missionaries* (2005).
